

# City Manager's Office:



The City continues to seek outside funding to help with the cost of building the new disinfectant byproduct plant. The facility is at 35% design and should be ready for construction to start in this fall. The estimated expenditure for this facility is now over \$60 million dollars. Thanks to Senator Schumer, the city's cost for this important project was just reduced by \$1 million dollars.

"After fighting tooth and nail in Washington for the City of Watertown all year long, I am proud to deliver this \$1 million injection of federal funding that will flow straight into critical repairs at the City of Watertown Water Treatment Plant, which is the backbone for water service that over 50,000 users in the City of Watertown, Fort Drum, and the surrounding municipalities rely on every day," said Senator Schumer. "This funding will help preserve and improve the city's drinking water quality and promote overall water conservation, so that our soldiers, families, and businesses across the community have access to the clean, safe, and reliable drinking water they deserve".

## Water Department:

#### Latest City News



The City is receiving \$1 Million dollars to support the construction of a new water treatment Disinfectant By-product (DBP) Facility that is currently being designed. The DBP facility will enhance the City's ability to continue to provide safe water. Construction should start this fall for this facility.

#### **Water Distribution:**

<u>Staffing Update</u>: As of 4/10/2024 there are 3 vacant positions within the Distribution Department (Senior Engineer, Water Maintenance Mechanic, and an MEO Light). On April 19<sup>th</sup> another MEO light position will be vacated as a member of the Department will be moving on to pursue other work.

<u>Service Repair:</u> Mulitple service repairs have been conducted work performed ranged from ball valve replacement to curb box resets.



<u>Service Replacements:</u> On 3/28 Staff renewed a ¾ inch service from the curb stop to the meter of a property on Cooper Street.

<u>Main Break Investigation:</u> Leak Studies are being performed by staff to invenstigate for main breaks or leaks on in the Distribution System. A main break was repaired in the 200 Block of Washington Street. The source of the leak was identified as a 6-inch hydrant branch.







#### **Wastewater:**

The Department of Public Works aided the Pollution Control facility by clearing the underground drain line from the secondary digester. This was necessary due to the accumulation of Struvite within the piping during the process of extracting water from the settled biosolids.



Experienced and junior personnel at the pollution control facility collaborate and undergo training together as they clear Struvite deposits from valves and piping.





The team at the Pollution Control Facility reinstalled one of the return sludge pumps after our operators installed a new mechanical seal. These pumps play a crucial role in transferring settled microorganisms from the final settling tank to the aeration tank. This process is essential for preserving a healthy balance of organic matter to organism ratio within the aeration tank.



Lift stations (pumps) are strategically located across the city in areas where the natural gravity flow of sewer water is impractical. These stations tend to accumulate grease and wipes, items that shouldn't be disposed of in the system. DPW and Pollution Control Facility operators collaborate to clean Ives I Lift Station.





National Grid, contractors, and Pollution Control Facility personnel coordinate efforts to replace an electric pole at the Cedar St lift station. The Pollution Control Facility's portable generator was present on-site to guarantee uninterrupted power supply to the station.

# **Department of Public Works:**

#### **Spring Trash Clean-Up:**

DPW has been out picking trash in various parts of the City trying to keep the City clean and nice looking. Recent winds have made it harder than usual but so has just general trash being thrown from passing motorists. Please help keep our City looking the best it can.





#### **Sewer Lateral Repairs:**

DPW crews have been out replacing sewer laterals damaged by freeze/thaw, blockages, or just from failures from pipe exceeding its lifespan. The process replacing these are hard at times with ground structures in the way or buried utilities right on top of them. It is a dirty messy job. Also, if you see the crews out completing another one, please give them space when driving around them.







#### **Equipment Maintenance:**

Spring is here and so is another year of construction season. The DPW garage is hard at work maintaining over 500 vehicles, large equipment, and small equipment throughout the city. Breakdowns occur regularly and the staff does all they can do to put each piece back into service as soon as possible.





#### **Electrical Updates:**

City electric has been out updating street lights, pedestrian crossing lights, and many more. Every month DPW does a light inspection throughout the whole City. DPW will repair city owned lights and also notify Niagra Mohawk when their network of lights are out. The department does an excellent job keeping the lights on all while updating city electric assetts.







# <u>Police Department:</u>

#### **Machete Assault:**

At about 3:30 pm on 03/26/24, WPD patrols responded to the area of Little Ceasar's restaurant (420 State Street) due to a physical altercation, including a possible stabbing. The investigation revealed that two people had been assaulted with a machete, which resulted in one victim being transported to SMC ER and the other victim being flown to Upstate Medical in Syracuse with serious injuries. The suspect, 18-year-old Shayquan J. Bullocks, was arrested and charged with one count of Assault in the First Degree (a class 'B' felony), Assault in the Second Degree (a class 'D' felony), and two counts of Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the Fourth Degree (a class 'A' misdemeanor). Bullocks was processed, arraigned, and held without bail in Jefferson County Jail.

#### **Eclipse Detail:**

The Watertown Police Department participated in an all-day solar eclipse detail, in and around Thompson Park on Monday, April 8th. Our recruit officers assisted veteran officers at stationary posts and on roving patrols around the park. We also staffed the command post and the Jefferson County Emergency Operations Center. Although there were some clouds throughout the day, the eclipse was still an amazing event. Fortunately, there were no major issues during the event, and regular police patrols were able to respond to all calls during the day.

#### **Police Academy:**

The police recruits are now in their fourth week of the field training program. They are now responding to calls, but always have a field training officer (FTO) with them. The FTO is not only the direct supervisor of the recruit officer, but they also help the recruit officer apply what they have learned in the classroom to actual call response on the street. The recruits are gradually given more and more responsibility during the program, until they are handling calls without any direct assistance from the FTO. We expect the recruit officers to complete their FTO program by the end of June.



# **Engineering Department:**

#### **City Hall Elevator Replacement:**

A pre-construction meeting for this project was held 03-22-2024. Elevattitt is expecting to begin construction on this project in early-July, 2024.

#### **Fairgrounds Grandstand Tile Replacement:**

Powis Contracting has installed all of the new tile for this project, and is nearly done applying the new grout.





#### Flower Memorial Library Rear Window and Lighting Replacement:

The contractor has installed all of the new windows on the rear side of the library, and is currently installing the new windows on the Library's sides.



#### William J Flynn Pool and Bathhouse Rehabilitation:

Con Tech Building Systems has installed the handicapped door operators, and the new keyes for the doors have arrived. The new pool pump and its controls have been installed, and a bouyancy test was done on the pool after it was filled with water. The pool shell passed the test, and the site is being prepared for the new fence installation. Hyde Stone has begun installing the new shower fixtures, and Blackstone Electric has begun the grounding wire installation for the Splash Pad.





# Fire Department:

#### **CPR Training:**

The department provided another CPR training class to employees from the DPW and Water departments. We would like to put out a challenge to all city departments to participate in our CPR and/or "Stop the Bleed" classes.



#### **Structure Fire Responses:**

On April 8, 2024, at 3:08 am, City of Watertown Fire Department crews responded mutual aid to Ft. Drum Fire Department for a working structure fire. There were no injuries reported,

#### **Propane Training:**

4/10/2024 – The department, along with the recruit class, worked with instructors from The Haz Mat Guys to learn more about our gas flaring kits. Crews practiced with both size kits to vent and burn propane once containers are compromised. E&V Energy/Patriot Tank Lines provided us with the tanks and product for training as well as a tour of their facility. Thank you to The Haz Mat Guys and E&V Energy for supporting our mission. While providing this training we were able to include recruits completing training in our RFFT program from our own department as well as those enrolled in our program from Ogdensburg Professional Firefighters Local 1799. All shifts as well as our recruit class have now completed this great hands-on training to help us protect the communities we serve.







#### **Solar Eclipse Event in the Park:**

The City of Watertown Fire Department along with all city staff worked tirelessly to prepare for the Solar Eclipse Celestial Event, the "Total Eclipse of the Park", and the added potential influx to our community. While our estimates were in the 12,000-20,000 range for attendance to the park (due to ticket sales of almost 12,000 alone), we were authorized for up to 30,000 attendees should unregistered attendees move to our cities event as they chased open skies and good weather. Additional resources were also allocated throughout the city to ensure we were able to respond through congested streets to any emergency that would arise. Attendees praised the coordination of the event in the park and were extremely happy with choosing our city as their location to visit. All city staff and partnering agencies did an excellent job in coordinating such an event. A special thanks to New York State Police, Jefferson County Sheriff's Office, Jefferson Couty Probation, Gold Star Security, Guilfoyle Ambulance Services, Volunteer Transportation Center, Zoo NY, Hale Transportation, as well as Burrville Power Equipment, Cazenovia Equipment Company, Waite Motorsports, Logan's Equipment, and FX Caprara Harley-Davidson for their assistance.






#### Play Ball!!!:
