

The City Council meets on the 1st and 3rd Monday of each month at 7 PM in the Council Chambers, 3rd Floor, 245 Washington St, Watertown, NY. The 2nd Monday of each month is held for Work Sessions, which are open discussions on topics requested by the Mayor and City Council. If there is a holiday on Monday, the Council Meeting or Work Session will take place on the following day, Tuesday. The public is welcome to attend all meetings. Fire Department

Structure Fire – May 17, 2025:

On May 17, 2025, the Fire Department responded to a structure fire in a duplex. Engine 2 was first on scene and observed smoke and visible flames through a side kitchen window. The front door was locked, so Engine 2 stretched a hose line and applied water through the window to knock down the fire. Heavy smoke was present on the first floor.

As additional units arrived, the Truck Company forced open the front door, and the Rescue Company gained access through the rear. Engine 2 entered through the front and quickly extinguished the remaining fire. The Rescue Company reported smoke on the second floor, while the adjacent unit was clear of smoke and unoccupied.



After the fire was out, crews ventilated the apartment using forced air. The fire was confined to the stove, microwave, and cabinetry above. A cooking pot was found on an active burner with charred contents. The microwave had partially melted, and its plastic components had dripped onto the

stovetop. Crews removed the microwave and the affected cabinetry. Power to the apartment was shut off at the breaker.

Smoke damage was limited to the kitchen and dining area. The fire was determined to have been caused by unattended cooking.

Small Fire in Apartment Hallway -May 22, 2025:

On May 22, 2025, the Fire Department responded to a report of a fire in the hallway of an apartment building at 168 Sterling St. Upon arrival, Chief 3 found Watertown Police on scene speaking with a tenant from Apartment 4. The tenant reported that he and his friends heard smoke alarms and discovered a wig on fire in the second-floor hallway.

The tenant used a nearby dry chemical extinguisher to put out the fire before crews arrived. Engine 1 confirmed the fire was fully extinguished with no extension to the structure. They requested a fan to ventilate the hallway of light smoke and chemical residue.

There were no injuries and no damage to the building.

Outdoor Fire – 210 Court Street:

On May 18, 2025, fire units responded to an outdoor fire behind 210 Court St. Engine 3 arrived to find a porta-john on fire behind a building under renovation. The crew extinguished the fire using a water can and moved the porta-john away from the structure. Police were on scene interviewing bystanders. After cooling the remaining material, Engine 3 returned to service.

Hazardous Materials Incident – 1255 Arsenal Street:

On May 16, 2025, the fire department responded to a hazardous materials incident at 1255 Arsenal St. Upon arrival, the building alarm indicated a peak carbon dioxide (CO_2) level of 1,270 PPM. The CO_2 tanks had already been shut

down, and the building was ventilated prior to our arrival. Crews conducted a full sweep with gas meters and found no detectable readings. No injuries were reported.

Memorial Day Remembrance Detail:



Off-duty and retired firefighters went to local cemeteries today and placed grave markers next to the headstones of our passed brothers. These flags and markers are put in place memorializing their past service and commitment to the City of Watertown, our Fire Department, and the community it serves. We wish to thank those who assisted for their commitment to our passed brothers in honor of their service.



Engineering

Backwater Valve Program:

The Engineering Department has mailed program announcements to 124 property owners in the Western Outfall target area. To date, we have received 19 requests for program applications. We encourage any residents considering participating in the program to contact the City Engineering Office for additional information. A program update will be scheduled for an upcoming City Council work session.

Sanitary Sewer Spot Repair Contract:

Powis Excavation has completed 7 spot repairs on sanitary sewer mains located within the Western Outfall Drainage Basin. There are 3 additional repair locations scheduled for completion by July.



Water Department



A total of 763.15 tons of valuable biosolids were hauled to local farm fields. Land applying biosolids helps preserve limited landfill space by keeping organic material out, while also providing local farmers with a nutrient-rich fertilizer alternative.

Maintenance staff at the Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) fabricated and installed rotating machine guards on newly refurbished Final A pumps.





Training is ongoing at the WWTP. At times, pumps may lose efficiency. Our operators are trained to recognize when this happens, troubleshoot the issue, and remove any debris causing the reduced performance. Trainees work alongside operators to identify the causes and assist in resolving the problems, gaining valuable hands-on experience.

A lift station in the collection system is a critical component used to move wastewater from lower to higher elevations when gravity flow isn't possible or practical. However, grease and debris—especially "UN"FLUSHABLE wipes—can accumulate in the sewer system and collect in lift stations. Over time, this buildup can damage pumps and other components. To



address this issue, WWTP staff, an outside hauler, and DPW personnel collaborated to clean the Gaffney Lift Station.

The trickling filters use biological treatment to help clean our wastewater. Water is evenly distributed over the media to support microbial growth. However, debris can often clog the orifices in the distribution arms. When this happens, WWTP staff enter the trickling filters to manually clear the blockages and restore proper flow.

WWTP operators and trainees replaced the original drive unit on Final Tank B. This drive moves activated sludge to the hopper so it can be returned to the aeration tank. If the sludge flight becomes inoperable, the tank would need to be taken offline due to the inability to remove activated sludge, potentially disrupting treatment processes. Replacing the drive in-house ensured continued operation and avoided costly downtime.

> A gravity thickener concentrates sludge before digestion by settling solids, removing scum, and returning supernatant to the head of the plant. This reduces volume and boosts digester efficiency .To

improve performance, plant staff installed a new scum baffle to prevent scum from flowing over the weirs and repaired the aluminum scraper. Completing this project in-house saved a significant amount of taxpayer dollars by avoiding the cost of hiring outside contractors. The team's ability to take on such a demanding task internally demonstrates the skill and resourcefulness of the WWTP staff. They overcame the challenges of confined space entry and intensive fall protection preparation. Through collaboration and by drawing on each member's strengths, the team not only enhanced the facility's operation but also provided a strong return on investment to the community by completing the work efficiently and cost-effectively.









Main Break/Leak Investigation:

On May 16, 2025, the 6-inch AC main on Monroe Ave was repaired by Distribution Staff.





Additional Work:

Distribution Staff assist with street reconstruction by the contractor on Burlington Street.

The Annual Flushing program is underway.





Distribution Staff have performed maintenance/replaced fire hydrants in various locations. Since May 5th, eight hydrants have been repaired and two have been replaced.




The first pickleball clinic of the season was a great success. The class was sold out with many on the wait list. The next clinic is scheduled for June 3rd & 4th.


