Fire Department

Training:

Department members recently trained on advancing hose lines to areas within a local manufacturing facility. We have had fires in the facility in the past and have experienced difficulty navigating hoselines, equipment and manpower to problem areas within the facility. This training allowed us to try several different options for advancing hoselines under controlled and safe conditions.



Vehicle Extrication Training:



in stabilizing the vehicle, accessing, and removing patients. This is a difficult and dangerous operation. Our crews The fire department recently conducted vehicle extrication training at our Massey Street Fire Station. The training simulated a vehicle rolled over in a ditch. Crews practiced several different techniques



took advantage of this opportunity to use our equipment and hone their skills in a controlled environment.

Structure Fire:



On June 28, 2025, at 3:50 a.m., the department was dispatched to a fully involved structure fire. Upon arrival, the Battalion Chief found a residential structure with heavy fire conditions that had already breached the roof. Fire department personnel, along with Watertown Police, confirmed that the residents were not home. Due to the advanced stage of the fire, crews initiated a defensive attack. The fire was contained to the residence and a few nearby items. No injuries were reported, and the cause of the fire remains under investigation.

Police Department

Concert in the Park:

Numerous members of the Watertown Police Department, along with K9 Bach and K9 Jochie were on hand at the annual Concert in the Park to ensure the community's safety and enjoyment. Concert in the Park Drug Arrest:

While working during the Concert in the Park event, undercover members of the Metro-Jefferson Drug Task Force recognized a woman from previous drug sales, 32-year-old Tyler Dawkins. They watched as she got out of a vehicle, walked into the crowd of concertgoers, and brought a man back to her vehicle. When detectives approached the vehicle, they observed the man, 38-year-old David Hagans, with what appeared to be cocaine on his lap and digital scales.

In total, detectives found nearly 20 grams of packaged cocaine, digital scales with white powder residue, 2 grams of methamphetamine and just over \$1,000 in cash.

As a result, Hagans and Dawkins were both arrested. Hagans was charged with third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance and criminal use of drug paraphernalia. Dawkins was charged with seventh-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance.

Public Works Department

Roads Crew:

DPW crews have been busy performing utility locates, supporting special events such as the upcoming Jefferson County Fair and the Farmers Market, and ensuring that all city-owned traffic signals and streetlights remain operational. For a crew of just three, they are doing an outstanding job!

Forestry:



With over 7000 city-owned trees and growing each year, there is a lot to keep up with.

Tree City Watertown requires a lot of maintenance, and the new City Forester is already hard at work evaluating, inspecting, and organizing tree work.



Buildings and Grounds:

This year B&G crews experimented with wildflowers on two different parcels in the City. Not only does this brighten up the City, but it reduces maintenance. The City needs more of this, and this test may encourage more areas to be completed.



Water Department

During the summer months, influent flows typically decrease while temperatures rise. This seasonal change causes the microorganisms responsible for breaking down biological material to become more active and require closer monitoring. As a result, we must reduce the number of tanks in operation to maintain effective treatment. Operators and maintenance staff use this opportunity to clean and inspect the offline tanks and associated piping.







Sometimes a little ingenuity goes a long way. Operational staff at the wastewater treatment facility recently worked together to solve a recurring issue with the chlorine analyzer plugging with debris. To address the problem, the team relocated the sample point farther from the tank wall and added a larger flush line. This modification ensures a more representative sample and significantly reduces the frequency of analyzer cleanings. Final Clarifier A is one of the oldest tanks at the wastewater treatment plant, the tank and drive units date back 61 years. Maintenance staff have kept the system operational through diligent preventative maintenance. However, despite their efforts, time has taken its toll on the equipment. Recently, the team had to modify the drive shaft to ensure the sprocket remains properly aligned and secured in place.







Preventative maintenance is essential for protecting and extending the life of the equipment the city owns. By proactively addressing wear and tear, staff at the wastewater treatment plant help prevent unexpected breakdowns and costly emergency repairs. Common tasks include changing oil, greasing bearings, replacing worn tubing, and tightening belts on drive units. Regular maintenance also provides opportunities to identify potential issues early, allowing for timely repairs and improved long-term reliability of the system.



The primary tank walkway had been deteriorating for years, resulting in a significant crack that posed a growing safety concern. This walkway was located near an area that operators accessed daily for manual operations. Last week, a contractor replaced the walkway to restore safe access. While the tank was offline, operators, maintenance staff,

and trainees took advantage of the downtime to replace sprockets, install new wear strips, and complete a full tank inspection.



Engineering Department

Burlington Street Reconstruction:

Burlington Street has been undergoing full road reconstruction, including new water and sanitary sewer mains, new sidewalks and retaining walls, and a new gas main. The selected contractor, POWIS Contracting, Inc., has installed the new water main from Saint Mary Street up Burlington Street to just after Farwell Street, and has installed two new stormwater catch basins. WOTS Backwater Prevention Plan Pilot:

Engineering received 13 applications from residents who wish to participate in the Backwater Valve Program last month. Engineering and DPW have inspected 11 of the applicants' residences to determine the scope of work required for a successful valve installation.

We highly encourage other residents in the pilot area of the **Western Outfall Basin** to contact City Hall with any questions about the program. The pilot program is designed to help the estimated 120 houses within the pilot area prevent backwater flooding.
