
We are proud of this well-deserved honor and join in congratulating her on this achievement!

Planning Department

219-221 West Lynde Street Rehabilitation:

Staff recently had a chance to tour this home to see the progress on the rehabilitation of this two-unit property. The house was included in Phase 2 of the City's Vacant Homes Redevelopment Initiative Request for Proposals that was issued in 2023. In the program, the City sought proposals from developers and contractors for the rehabilitation and redevelopment of several residential homes located throughout the City of Watertown. The City had taken title to the homes through the tax foreclosure process and desired to work with local developers and contractors to complete a good quality rehabilitation of the properties to ensure that they no longer have a negative effect on the neighborhood in which they were located. The property was sold to Micah Matteson of Matteson Property Management, LLC in August of 2023 and closed later that fall. To date, a new roof and siding has been installed and one of the two units has been rehabilitated. Improvements in the first unit include the addition of a new bathroom and remodel of the old bath, kitchen upgrades, new flooring throughout in addition to paint and new appliances. Rehabilitation of the second unit, which will include similar improvements, is currently underway. Below are before and after pictures of the property.

<u>Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Consolidated Annual Performance Evaluation Report (CAPER):</u>

Staff recently submitted the City's CAPER for the CDBG Program. The CAPER is a year-end report of the CDBG activities that the City undertook during the most recent program year, which ran from July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025. Some of the City's accomplishments during the 2024 Program Year included completing the Seward Street Reconstruction Project and the Franklin Street ADA Ramp Replacement Project. Working in partnership with the Watertown Housing Authority (WHA), the City also completed the WHA Meadowbrook Sidewalk Reconstruction Project. In addition, work began on both the Burlington Street Reconstruction Project and the design for the Huntington Street Water Main Project.

Additionally, the City continued to work on our various housing rehabilitation programs and the homebuyer program, addressing the City's CDBG goal of providing decent affordable housing for low-to-moderate income residents. Over the course of the year, Neighbors of Watertown, the City's housing rehab subrecipient, oversaw the rehabilitation of thirteen (13) owner occupied housing units. Seven (7) homebuyers were also assisted with down payment assistance toward the purchase of new homes along with funds for minor repairs.

Friends of Thompson Park Volunteer Workday:

Forty-four people participated in the September 13 Thompson Park Workday held by the Friends of Thompson Park, including 32 students from Watertown High School and Immaculate Heart Central High School. WHS was represented by the Girls and Boys Varsity Cross Country team and the Volunteer Club. IHC was represented by the Faith Community Services Program. Volunteers removed stones, small tree stumps and other debris from trails in the western section of Thompson Park near the Gotham Street Overlook. The Friends of



Thompson Park will host their final two workdays of the year on Saturday, October 25 and Saturday, November 8 from 9 am. to 12 pm.



Engineering Department

Burlington Street Reconstruction:

Burlington Street is undergoing a full road reconstruction, including new water and sanitary sewer mains, new sidewalks and retaining walls, and a new gas main. The City's contractor, POWIS Contracting, Inc., has installed all the new sanitary, storm sewer, and water mains and services on the street, and has completed most of the installation of the new retaining walls and stairs. Curbing has been placed, and the new sidewalk installation will commence immediately following completion of curbs. Overhead utilities including electricity, cable and communications are underway and should wrap up by the end of the week.





City Hall Court Renovation:

Watertown City Court and the First Floor of City Hall will be going through renovation, including new lighting, plumbing, HVAC, security doors, and a new air handling system along with repairs to the City Hall Building's roof. The design for this project was presented to the City Council at their September 8, 2025, meeting, and is now out to bid. Bids for this project will be opened on October 30, 2025.

Hydro Plant Dam Toe Inspection:



The Federal Emergency Regulating Commission (FERC) requires that a Concrete Toe Inspection of the dam be completed every six to ten years. The last inspection was delayed due to COVID.

The Engineering department solicited bids and the project has been awarded to Gomez and Sullivan. Once the water level reaches the necessary levels, the inspection will be conducted.

Public Works Department

Hungerford Storm Project:

Our sewer division has been working on a large storm project on Hungerford Street. New infrastructure has been installed along the north shoulder of the street. These projects are crucial in finding, maintaining and mitigating stormwater runoff.

Forestry:

SAVE THE DATE: Tree Watertown's 24th Annual Fall Tree Planting Project is scheduled for Saturday, November 1, 2025, at 9:00 a.m. Approximately 45 trees will be planted within Bicentennial Park and the Alex T. Duffy Fairgrounds. All interested volunteers should meet at the pavilion in Bicentennial Park, located just north of the ice arena. Trees and supplies for the project will be purchased using grant funding obtained through the Northern New York Community Foundation's Carolyn Whitney Tree Fund. DPW Buildings and Grounds will assist by preparing the planting holes for volunteers. Student volunteers from both Watertown High School and Immaculate Heart Central High School, along with Tree Watertown members, will complete the planting.

Water Distribution Department

Service Repair:

Multiple service repairs have been conducted work performed ranged from ball valve replacement to curb box resets, and frozen meter replacements. Commercial water meter replacements have also been conducted at various locations.



Main Break/Leak Investigation:



A leaking bell joint was repaired on the 24-inch transmission main on September 22. On October 9, 2025, an insertion valve will be installed to assist in any future isolations of the main in the section off Eastern Blvd.

Additional Work:

Distribution Staff assisted with street reconstruction by the contractor on Burlington Street.

Staff assisted with contracted work for 231 Commerce Park. Two new private hydrants have been installed, and the fire service has been started.

Staff completed the first checks of the City's fire hydrants. These checks include a general visual inspection and pumping out water that does not drain from hydrants as part of cold-weather preparations. There are approximately 880 hydrants that must be checked and dewatered.

From October 1 through October 6, staff completed sidewalk repairs to various areas around the City. As a result of fire hydrant replacement and water service repairs.

Waste Water Department



During the spring and fall, the Pollution Control Facility (PCF) sees an increase in solids, making it essential that our dewatering equipment is running smoothly. Recently, after hours of careful troubleshooting, our operations and maintenance team identified the issue with a dewatering feed pump and

ball in a one-way valve. Dewatering systems can be affected by many factors, so it's a win for the team when we're back to 100% operational capacity!





A recent upgrade to the digester mixing system replaced the old gas mixers with a new Rotamix system. The new system uses chopper pumps and directional nozzles, enhancing mixing efficiency, an essential part of digester operations. The crew carefully removed the old system, completing the work safely and efficiently while avoiding additional contractor costs.



Maintenance staff recently replaced a motor on one of the facility's mixers, an important piece of equipment that helps remove FOG (fats, oils, and grease) from the primary settling tank. Removing FOG is a crucial step in the treatment process because it prevents buildup that can interfere with plant operations.

Four operators from the Pollution Control Facility recently competed in the Operations Challenge at WEFtec. The competition gives operators the chance to earn continuing education credits required to maintain their licenses, explore new technologies, and gain hands-on experience. It's also a great



opportunity to meet operators from across the country and around the world, sharing knowledge and learning best practices from outside their own facilities.





The exhaust pipes from the engines that pump influent water into the facility get extremely hot. Because the plant is located near ball fields and a public trail, the maintenance team built a protective guard around the pipes to keep every safe from accidental contact.


We will be closed on Saturday, October 11th due to a planned power outage.
