

10-20-2025 Meeting Minutes

#### **Reminder:**

The City Council meets on the 1st and 3rd Monday of each month at 7 PM in the Council Chambers, 3rd Floor, 245 Washington St, Watertown, NY. The 2nd Monday of each month is held for Work Sessions, which are open discussions on topics requested by the Mayor and City Council. If there is a holiday on Monday, the Council Meeting or Work Session will take place on the following day, Tuesday. The public is welcome to attend all meetings. City Council Minutes & Agendas are available online, and the Meetings and Work Sessions are captured on video by Steve Weed Productions.

The City Council Meetings for November are on **Monday, November 3,** and **Monday, November 17, 2025**. The November City Council Work Session is **Monday, November 10, 2025**.

## **Assessment Department**

NYS Office of Real Property will automatically be moving residents who are 65+ and make less than \$107,000 a year to the Enhanced STAR Program. In years past, those individuals wishing to make the switch from Basic STAR to Enhanced STAR had to file an exemption form in the Assessor's office. Senior exemption renewals and nonprofit renewal forms have been mailed and are due in the Assessor's office no later than December 1, 2025.

Anyone who receives a form in the mail from the NYS Department of Taxation and Finance MUST return it to them. If anyone needs assistance filling out the forms, we would be happy to help and assist in the mailing, faxing, or emailing of those documents back to NYS.

School tax bills were mailed. Anyone with questions needs to call the Watertown City School District Tax Collector, Jenna, at 315-785-3713 for assistance. The City of Watertown is no longer collecting payments for the school tax bills.

The Assessment office will be closed sporadically this month and into November as we finish up field work ahead of our December 1<sup>st</sup> deadline. Our schedule will be based on the weather, and a sign will be on display if we are closed. We will also have a file cube on the counter for exemption paperwork to be dropped off. ### **Leo Rutledge Memorial Shooting Range:**

On October 14<sup>th</sup>, 2025, the Watertown Police Firing Range was officially dedicated in memory of former Officer Leo Rutledge.

From 1966 until his retirement in 1988, Leo served our community with integrity, professionalism, and an unwavering commitment to public safety. He was a graduate of the FBI Academy, served as a firearms instructor, and was an expert in fingerprinting.

Leo made many valuable contributions throughout his career, but perhaps the most notable was the development of a new firing range. He recognized the unsafe training conditions at the old stone quarry firing range and took it upon himself to find a safer alternative. He spent countless hours planning, organizing, and overseeing the development of a new range facility that we still use today. Thanks to his dedication, officers have been able to train in a

safe and effective environment, a legacy of his unwavering concern for the well-being of his colleagues.

A beautifully crafted sign has been erected at the range in his honor—a lasting reminder of his service and dedication. This would not have been possible without the hard work and generosity of several retired members of the department who came together to design and donate the sign. Their efforts reflect the deep respect and admiration held for Leo and his contributions to the Watertown Police Department.

#### Black River/St. Lawrence Valley Police Academy:



The Black River/St. Lawrence Valley Police Academy Class of **2025-2026** is in its 19<sup>th</sup> week of training. Over the past few weeks, police academy recruits received training in Emergency Vehicle Operations (EVOC), Reality-Based Training, and Standardized Field Sobriety Tests (SFST).





## **Fire Department**

### **Fire Department Recruit Academy:**



Week 11 is underway for our Fire Department recruits, and they're continuing to impress! Last week, the recruits got hands-on experience with **vehicle extrication**, learning how to safely and efficiently remove victims from crashed vehicles using hydraulic rescue tools—often called the "Jaws of Life." They practiced stabilizing vehicles, removing doors and roofs, and working as a team under simulated emergency conditions.

This week, the focus shifts to Firefighter Assist

and Search Team (FAST)

training. These drills prepare the recruits for one of the most critical tasks in the fire service—rescuing a fellow firefighter who becomes lost, trapped, or injured inside a structure fire.

Their hard work and progress over the past 11 weeks are setting the foundation for a strong and capable next generation of firefighters!



#### **CPR Saves Lives:**



Twice this month, Watertown Fire Department crews responded to cardiac arrest emergencies—and in both cases, the patients were revived and delivered to the hospital alive.

These outcomes show just how powerful early CPR can be. When CPR is started immediately by a bystander, a person's chance of survival can double or even triple. Every minute

without CPR reduces the chance of survival by about 10%.

**Survival starts with you.** When community members step in to begin CPR before first responders arrive, lives are saved.

### **Structural Collapse Training:**



Our firefighters are hard at work this week, advancing their structural collapse rescue skills! The focus is on exterior shoring techniques—methods used to stabilize buildings that have been weakened by fire,

vehicle impacts, or damage from storms or earthquakes.

Not all fire departments are equipped to provide **technical rescue services** like structural collapse response. These operations require extensive training, specialized equipment, and ongoing maintenance—all of which require significant effort.

The Watertown Fire Department has been providing these advanced rescue capabilities for more than 20 years, helping protect our community and the surrounding region when disasters strike. Much of this



program's success has been made possible through **grant funding**, which covers the expenses of equipment and training.



Our continued commitment to technical rescue ensures that when the unthinkable happens, we're ready to respond.

## **Planning Department**

#### **Burlington St. Reconstruction Project:**



This project, which the City is partially paying for using CDBG funding, is nearing completion, as surface work begins to take place. Once complete, the reconstructed Burlington Street will feature new sidewalks from end to end, replacing aging and substandard sidewalks as well as filling in previously

existing sidewalk gaps. The project also includes new ADA ramps and other ADA improvements where possible, new street trees and increased snow storage, all of which will enhance livability and quality of life. The street will also convert from a two-way traffic pattern to one-way northbound, which was the residents' preferred design.





#### **Division St. East Sidewalk Project:**

Work is underway on this CDBG PY 2025 project, which will fill in an approximately 900-foot sidewalk gap on Division Street East and connect the multifamily housing development at the east end of the street with Adams Recreational Park, William J. Flynn Swimming Pool, and North

Elementary School. This had been one of the most prominent gaps in the City's sidewalk network.



City Department of Public Works (DPW) crews are performing the work, and the City will receive reimbursement through the CDBG program for DPW crew time and materials.

#### **CDBG 2020 Annual Action Plan Amendment:**

Staff recently completed the process to amend the City's 2020 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Annual Action Plan. The plan included various projects for the 2020-2021 Program Year, three of which came in under budget: the North Side ADA Ramp Replacement Project Phase 2, the Target Area Smoke Detector Program and the Tilden Street/Starbuck Avenue Sidewalk Project. In addition, the NDC Housing Stabilization Program did not move forward as the residential structure that was going to be stabilized with the funding was torn down.

The purpose of the amendment was to reallocate the remaining \$78,217.40 in funding to the Burlington Street Reconstruction Project. Using additional Federal funding for the project will lower the amount of local funds needed from the general, water and sewer funds. The amendment process included drafting an amendment to the plan, holding a public hearing and conducting a 30-day public comment period. The City Council approved the amendment on October 20, 2025.

#### **Planning Commission Meeting Update:**

On October 7, 2025, the Planning Commission reviewed a proposed amendment to the Zoning Ordinance related to marijuana dispensaries. During the meeting, Commission members discussed the proposed changes and adopted a motion recommending the changes with a few modifications. There is a public hearing scheduled for November 3, 2025, after which the City Council will consider the amendment.

#### **Watertown Urban Mission Food Pantry Project Agreement:**

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)
Annual Action Plan that was adopted by the City
Council on July 7, 2025, included \$8,000 to pay for
food and associated supplies in support of the
Watertown Urban Mission (WUM) Food Pantry. Staff



completed the environmental review and wrote a project agreement, which provided the WUM program requirements it needs to fulfill for the project. The grant agreement was approved by City Council on October 20, 2025. The food will be made available to low- and moderate-income families within the City of Watertown.

# <u>United Way of NNY/Watertown City School District Food 4 Families Program</u> Agreement:

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Annual Action Plan that was adopted by the City Council on July 7, 2025, included \$8,000 to pay for food and associated supplies in support of the Watertown City School District's Food 4 Families program. Staff



completed the environmental review and wrote a project agreement for the funding. The grant agreement was approved by City Council on October 20, 2025. The food will be made available to low- and moderate-income students and their families within the Watertown City School District.

#### **Forestry:**

SAVE THE DATE: Tree Watertown's 24th Annual Fall Tree Planting Project is scheduled for Saturday, November 1, 2025, at 9:00 a.m. Approximately 45 trees will be planted within Bicentennial Park and the Alex T. Duffy Fairgrounds. All interested volunteers should meet at the pavilion in Bicentennial Park, located just north of the ice arena. Trees and supplies for the project will be purchased using grant funding obtained through the Northern New York Community Foundation's Carolyn Whitney Tree Fund. DPW Buildings and Grounds will assist by preparing the planting holes for volunteers. Student volunteers from both Watertown High School and Immaculate Heart Central High School, along with Tree Watertown members, will complete the planting.

## **Water Distribution Department**

#### **Lead Service Replacements:**



One replacement has been conducted since the last update.

#### **Service Repair:**



Multiple service repairs have been conducted work performed ranged from ball valve replacement to curb box resets, and frozen meter replacements.

Commercial water meter replacements have also been conducted at various locations.

### Main Break/Leak Investigation:

On October 9, 2025, staff performed a leak investigation for a property on Chestnut Street. The cause was identified as a leak from the service and was repaired by the department.





### **Additional Work:**

Distribution Staff assisted with street reconstruction by the contractor on Burlington Street.

Staff assisted with contracted work for 231 Commerce Park Drive, samples were collected from the service and hydrants.

On October 9, staff assisted with the installation of a 24-inch insertion valve on Eastern Blvd. This will allow for one valve isolation to perform the work previously achieved by isolating 3 valves.









Staff assisted DPW with road repairs to various areas.



## **Waste Water Department**



The Water Department welcomed about 25 water professionals from the New York Water Environment Association (NYWEA) for a tour of our Pollution Control Facility. The group got a firsthand look at all our treatment processes and had great conversations

throughout the visit. The tour was an engaging and informative day where they shared lessons learned, exchanged stories, and discussed common challenges faced at their own facilities. It was a great day of connection, learning, and collaboration.




