City of Watertown Receives Honorable Mention for NYCOM Local Government Achievement Award

The City of Watertown received honorable mention as part of NYCOM's Local Government Achievement Awards for 2026. The awards program recognized Watertown for its Refuse Collection Restructure Project, an effort to improve operational efficiency and enhance service delivery through innovative, low-cost solutions.

"This project reflects a practical and forward-thinking approach to improving core municipal services," said NYCOM President Bill Brazill, Mayor of the Village of Minoa. "Watertown identified an opportunity to improve efficiency and resident experience at the same time, and implemented a solution that strengthens service delivery in a very simple but cost-effective way."

The project restructures the City's refuse collection system by replacing outdated, fragmented routes with five clearly defined, GPS-optimized service zones. In addition, Watertown launched an interactive address lookup map to provide residents with easy, real-time access to collection schedules and service information. Together, these improvements have streamlined operations, reduced inefficiencies and improved overall service consistency across the City.

By consolidating routes into clearly defined service areas, the City has reduced travel time, improved workload balance for collection crews, and decreased vehicle mileage and fuel use. The interactive mapping tool has also improved communication with residents, reducing confusion, lowering call volumes, and increasing overall satisfaction with city services.

This honorable mention will be presented on May 14th at NYCOM's Annual Meeting in Bolton Landing. NYCOM represents cities and villages in New York State and has been in existence since 1910.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Structure Fire – 209 Mechanic Street

Watertown firefighters responded to 209 Mechanic Street at 11:19 PM for a reported structure fire. While enroute Jefferson County Dispatch advised that the caller reported flames showing. Engine 2 arrived at a vacant 2-story duplex with heavy fire showing through the roof.

The structure was boarded up, making entry difficult. Engine 2 attempted an interior attack; however, progress was halted by a large hole in the floor. Due to unsafe structural conditions operations were moved to a defensive.

At the height of the fire, multiple handlines and master streams were utilized to extinguish the fire. Extinguishment was difficult due to numerous structural changes over the years and multiple roofs, creating many voids.

The Town of Watertown Fire Department was requested on mutual aid to assist with the recall of personnel to cover the city. There were no injuries to civilians or fire department personnel.



Awards Ceremony

On Friday, May 1st, the department presented 86 awards to its officers and firefighters for 24 different emergency incidents. The awards ranged from Stork Pins for assisting in the delivery of a child in the field to Life Saving citations and many in between. The emergencies involved water rescues, childbirths, cardiac arrests, structure fires, a scaffolding rescue, an industrial accident, and more.

A member of the community who was resuscitated by department personnel attended the awards ceremony to personally thank his rescuers. While firefighters are often modest and quick to say they were simply doing their job, the ceremony provided a meaningful opportunity to recognize their dedication in front of their peers, families, and friends.

The department also swore in its newest officer, Captain Chad Crosby, a 15-year veteran of the department.

The department also congratulated Captain Derek Derouin on his retirement after more than 28 years of service.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT



Vacant Rental Program

The City of Watertown has partnered with Neighbors of Watertown, Inc., to work with property owners to repair and rehabilitate vacant homes in the City to increase the supply of rental housing, bring vacant housing units back into productive use and improve neighborhoods.

The City assisted Neighbors of Watertown in securing \$2.5 million in grant funding from New York State through the Vacant Rental Program. Grants of \$50,000 to \$75,000 are available per eligible housing unit to make repairs and improvements such as health and safety improvements and correction of code violations. Typical improvements could include roof and window replacement, siding replacement, plumbing and heating repairs and much more.

Planning and Code Enforcement Staff recently worked together to send owners of vacant and blighted homes identified in our vacant housing database a letter informing them of the program and providing a copy of the program application. Division Street Sidewalks

Work is nearing completion on the Division Street sidewalk project, which will fill in a critical gap in the City's sidewalk network. The new sidewalk, along the south side of Division Street East, runs adjacent to John Adams Field and provides a pedestrian connection from the Starwood Apartments multifamily housing development to the William J. Flynn Municipal Swimming Pool. No sidewalks previously existed on this segment of Division Street East. The City is paying for the project entirely with Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Entitlement funds.



Community Development Block Grant Project – 531 Bradley Street Demolition

The demolition of 531 Bradley Street was completed on April 27. The structure was in very poor condition and had been the subject of complaints from neighbors. The removal of the structure has eliminated blight in this area of the City. Bids for the project were opened in February and were awarded to the contractor in March. After ensuring that all required documentation was submitted, the contractor was issued a Notice to Proceed with the demolition. The contractor has demolished the house and has seeded the now level ground. The attached pictures show what 531 Bradley St. was like before, during and after the demolition process.

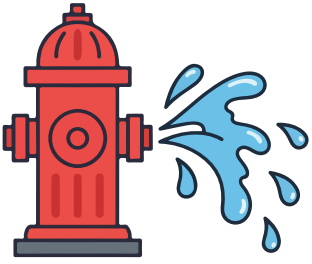

WATER DEPARTMENT



Hydrant Flushing

The annual hydrant flushing program started May 3rd and will run until June 25th. Staff will perform flushing from 6:00 PM until 2:00 AM Sunday to Thursday. A detailed list of times, dates, and streets can be found on the City website.

Service Repair

Various services across the city have had repairs due to extreme cold temperatures. Since the start of the year, 46 water meters have been replaced as a result of freezing. Multiple services have been isolated due to frozen burst pipes or ice dams damaging gas services, leaving the property without heat.



Service Replacements

One Service line was replaced from the curb stop to the meter.



Hydrant Repair

Staff have repaired two hydrants and evaluated more damaged from use.



Main Break/Leak Investigation

Leak studies have been performed in various areas of the city and identified one service leak that was repaired and another that will be repaired or renewed in the coming weeks.

Safety/Training

On 4/29/26 the annual required training through McNeil has been completed by the water department.

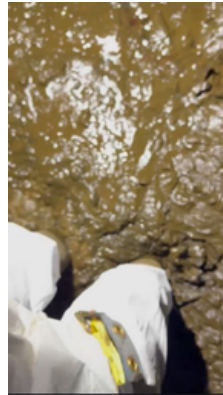
WATER TREATMENT PLANT

The Water Treatment Plant periodically cleans its coagulation and sedimentation (contact) tanks as part of routine maintenance to ensure optimal treatment performance. During normal operation, these basins remove suspended particles by forming and settling solids, which accumulate over time as sludge on the tank floor. If not removed, this buildup can reduce the effective treatment volume, interfere with proper settling, and lead to solids being carried over to the filtration process. In addition, older sludge can become septic, producing gases that cause solids to rise and further impact water clarity. Regular cleaning helps maintain proper hydraulic conditions, supports efficient particle removal, and protects downstream processes, ensuring the continued delivery of high-quality drinking water.



Coagulation and sedimentation tank maintenance and cleaning (Contact Tank)

The Water Treatment Plant will be conducting its annual sludge pit cleanout operation over the coming weeks. This is a routine but critical maintenance activity that ensures the continued efficiency and reliability of the treatment process. This year, operations will begin with the center pit, which contains a heavier and more concentrated sludge layer. Due to the consistency of this material, additional dilution and circulation efforts will be required to allow for proper movement and removal. The team anticipates focusing on this section for the duration of the cleanout, which is expected to take approximately two weeks.

The Water Treatment Plant has officially launched its dredge for the upcoming dredging season. This annual operation is an important part of maintaining proper capacity and performance within the plant's process basins. In the coming weeks, the team will be installing discharge piping from the dredge to the designated drying beds, where removed material will be safely managed and dewatered. This proactive work helps ensure efficient plant operation and supports the continued delivery of high-quality drinking water to the community.

The Water Treatment Plant’s ongoing sludge management program plays a critical role in maintaining efficient operations, protecting water quality, and ensuring compliance with state and federal regulations. Routine cleaning of coagulation and sedimentation (contact) tanks, annual sludge pit cleanout, and seasonal dredging operations all work together to remove accumulated solids from the treatment process. These efforts help maintain proper hydraulic conditions, prevent solids carryover to filtration, and ensure the plant continues to operate as designed.

Over time, solids removed during treatment settle and accumulate within basins and pits. If not properly managed, this buildup can reduce treatment capacity, interfere with settling processes, and negatively impact overall system performance. Regular removal of this material supports improved treatment efficiency and contributes to the consistent production of high-quality drinking water for the community.

The Water Treatment Plant recently identified damage to an exterior electrical control box, likely caused during snow removal operations over the winter months. This box contains 480-volt wiring used to operate the facility’s main access gate remotely from the control room. Once snow conditions subsided and a suitable weather window allowed for safe repairs, the Water Filtration Plant maintenance team replaced the damaged unit with a new watertight electrical enclosure. This repair restores full functionality of the gate system and ensures continued safe and reliable operation.

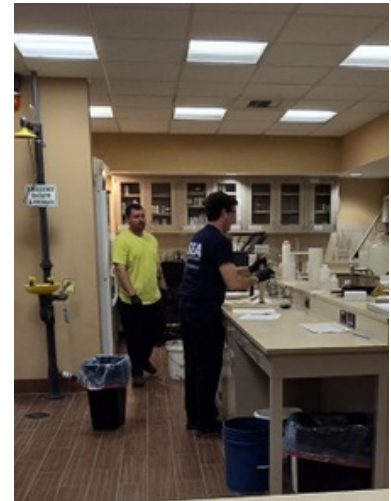

POLLUTION CONTROL



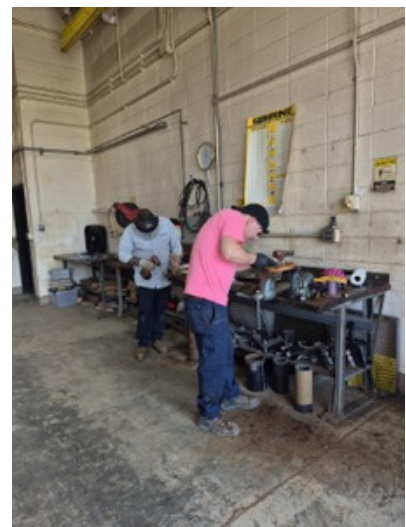
After an extended period of wet weather and high flows, the crew at the Pollution Control Facility was finally able to safely enter the detritor area at the headworks as flows have now decreased. Staff removed accumulated rock and debris and installed a new grease fitting on the screw conveyor to ensure preventative maintenance activities can continue to be performed effectively.

Chemical bid proposals for treatment chemicals at the Pollution Control Facility have been received. Each year, facility operators conduct performance testing on proposed chemical products to evaluate treatment efficiency and compare dosage requirements against overall cost to ensure the most effective and economical option is selected.



The Pollution Control Facility is continuing to return to normal operations following the major maintenance evolution involving the cleaning of the 770,000-gallon primary digester. During the cleaning process, the facility continued to collect solids but had limited ability to process them. With the digester back in service, solids are once again being actively processed rather than stored, allowing operation to normalize.

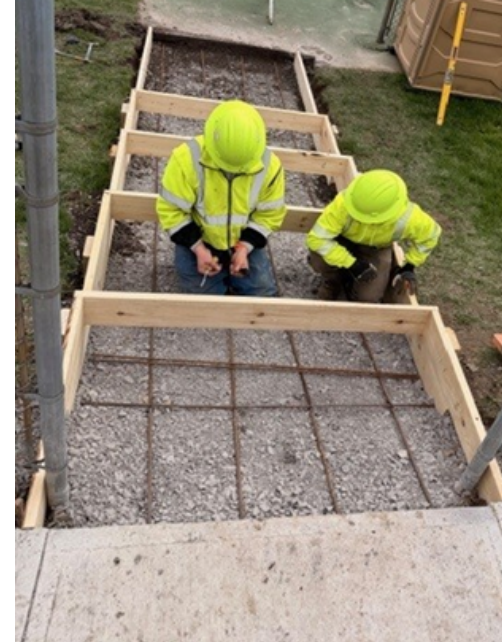
Operators at the Pollution Control Facility are repairing internal components of a valve associated with the Final A Settling Tank. The valve was leaking and permitted air intrusion into the system during sludge pump operation.



DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

Roads Division

Crews continue progress on Division Street with installation of new sidewalks, placement and grading of topsoil for restoration, construction of driveway approaches, and installation of stair access connecting the sidewalk to the adjacent park. This work improves pedestrian accessibility, drainage, and overall streetscape conditions in the corridor.



Sewer Division



Crews are utilizing the new sewer van throughout the city to enhance efficiency and response capabilities. Its compact design allows improved maneuverability in tight and congested areas, enabling work in locations that were previously difficult to access. In addition, the sewer crew continues installing new infrastructure along city streets to support system reliability and long-term service improvements.

Training

Crews participated in a two-day equipment training hosted by Milton CAT focused on operation of the paver and roller ahead of the paving season. The training included both classroom instruction and hands-on field exercises, where crews conducted a mock paving operation using sand. Staff gained a deeper understanding of advanced paver functions, improved operational techniques, and had the opportunity to ask detailed questions in a practical setting. The timing of this training positions crews well for the start of the paving season.



Forestry Division

On April 24, 2026, the City celebrated 26 years as a Tree City USA community alongside Mayor Sarah Compo Pierce and Tree Watertown during the annual Arbor Day event. A Bur Oak was planted by DPW in honor of Mike Lumbis, Planning and Community Development Director, in recognition of his leadership and decades-long commitment to the City's tree program. Throughout his 30-year career with the City, Mike has played a key role in the planting of thousands of trees that continue to shape Watertown's urban forest.



On April 25, 2026, the City held its annual spring volunteer tree planting in partnership with the Watertown Noon Rotary and Tree Watertown. For more than 30 years, the Rotary has supported this effort through donations and hands-on participation. This year, more than 60 volunteers planted 53 trees along Ohio Street and Eastern Boulevard. Special thanks are extended to New York State Department of Transportation for issuing the necessary permit, and to the DPW Buildings and Grounds crew for preparing the planting sites in advance of the event.

Electrical Division

The City of Watertown and DPW would like to recognize the retirement of Chris Misercola following 30 years of dedicated service to the Electrical Department. Chris was known for his attention to detail, strong work ethic, and commitment to the job, serving as a role model to many throughout his career.
